New Jersey Schools Development Authority CEO Attends Ribbon Cutting Ceremony for New School



New Jersey Schools Development Authority (SDA) CEO Marc D. Larkins, Esq. and his Chief of Staff Jason Ballard attended the ribbon cutting ceremony at Elizabeth Public Schools Mabel G. Holmes School No. 5 to celebrate the opening of their Annex for Early Childhood Education.

Larkins was appointed in February of 2010 by Governor Chris Christie to serve as the Chief Executive Officer of the Schools Development Authority. He is responsible for the management and implementation of the state's school construction program throughout New Jersey.

Mabel G. Holmes, School No. 5 Annex is located in the former St. Hedwig's Grammar School building. An agreement made between Elizabeth Public Schools and the Catholic Archdiocese of Newark in May of last year made possible the leasing of three elementary schools formerly operated by the archdiocese to be used to educate pre-school children in Elizabeth. St. Adalbert's School located in Elizabethport and Blessed Sacrament School located in North Elizabeth were opened earlier in the school year.

Board of Education President Carlos Trujillo stated, "This school and the other two that we have entered into contract with the Archdiocese of Newark will allow us to offer early childhood education to about five hundred children who have been on a waiting list. It is my understanding now that the waiting list has been depleted."



Carlos Trujillo thanked the authority's representatives for their continued support of the Elizabeth Public Schools. The Board of Education recognized the State of New Jersey for the work they are doing in Elizabeth to expand early childhood and furthering educational opportunities for all children. "Schools like this are possible because of the partnership and the interest the State of New Jersey and the SDA has taken in the education of the students in the City of Elizabeth," said Trujillo.

Larkins expressed equal praise of the management

of the Elizabeth Board of Education. "I want to take the opportunity to congratulate the Elizabeth Board of Education on behalf of the State and the Christie administration and the Schools Development Authority. It's certainly exciting to be here and to have the opportunity to partner with districts that show leadership, innovation, and a bit of ingenuity in terms of how they address the problems regarding early childhood classroom space. The district is making fantastic use of those facilities and I think the kids are benefitting from it."

Prior to the ribbon cutting ceremony, Larkins and Ballard visited Dr. Albert Einstein Academy School No. 29 and Ronald Reagan Academy School No. 30, which were both completed in 2006, as well as the Academic High School and Victor Mravlag School No. 21 construction site on Shelley Avenue. New Jersey Schools Development Authority Moves Forward With Funding for New School No. 21



On Wednesday January 5, 2011, the New Jersey Schools Development Authority (SDA) proceeded with its recommendation to fund and complete the construction of Victor Mravlag School No. 21 in Elizabeth, New Jersey. The new school, located at 132 Shelley Avenue, will help provide more instructional excellence for Elizabeth Public Schools' students from that community.

The New Jersey Development Authority is a public agency that is responsible for financing, renovating and constructing educational infrastructure in special-needs districts. The

Elizabeth Board of Education has been working closely with the SDA to renovate its aging educational facilities. The Elizabeth Board of Education recognizes that the support of Governor Chris Christie is crucial to the completion of this project.

School No. 21, located in the Elmora Hills section of Elizabeth, has been a focal point of neighborhood life for decades. Built in 1930, the school served first as a neighborhood elementary facility through the 1970s and then became the headquarters for the school system's full day gifted and talented program for elementary students. The exterior and interior of the building were meticulously maintained throughout the years; however the demands of 21st Century educational programs, technology and the neighborhood's growing population were all key factors in the Elizabeth Public Schools' decision to modernize the existing facility.

The original facility housed a total of 231 students in pre-kindergarten through the third grade and was about 40,000 square feet. When it opens in September 2012, School No. 21 will be home to 500 pre-kindergarten through grade eighth students and will have almost doubled in size. The new building will be a neighborhood school and offer state-of-the art classrooms, a large gymnasium, a cafetorium with a stage and backstage workshops, instrumental and choral music rooms, a piano lab, a science classroom with an adjacent demonstration lab, a functional and technologically advanced media center, a technology lab, and a fully-equipped art studio.

The Board of Education is working closely with the New Jersey Schools Development Authority to proceed with construction of a new neighborhood school in Elmora Hills-School No. 21 as well as the construction of a new Gifted and Talented-Academic High School. Elizabeth Board of Education Member Fernando Nazco stated "The completion of these two new schools for the residents of Elizabeth is a definitive priority for this administration. We will work arduously to ensure that this comes to fruition." *The State of New Jersey is fully funding the construction of School No.21 and a new Academic High School.*

The CEO of the New Jersey Schools Development Authority Marc D. Larkins, Esq. visited the construction site of School No. 21 on Monday January 3rd, 2012. He was accompanied by Elizabeth Board President Carlos Trujillo; Board members Francisco González, Paul Perreira, and Fernando Nazco; former Board member Rafael Fajardo; and Superintendent of Schools Pablo Muñoz.

EPS Hopes New Law Will Force City To Acknowledge Gang Problems

Elizabeth Public Schools heralded the signing of new legislation which requires municipalities to provide gang related activity to the proper authorities. The new law will improve the way the district fights gang activity and will help "improve safety for our children," stated Francisco González, Elizabeth Board of Education Member. The legislation was sponsored by Assemblyman Gordon Johnson and Senator Ron Rice to improve data collection techniques and was signed into law by Governor Chris Christie.

Bill (A-3264/S-1537) requires that information contained in gang related incident offense reports be forwarded to the Superintendent of State Police and included in the Uniform Crime Report. "It requires that cities acknowledge that they have a gang problem, requiring them to report the data to the appropriate authorities at once," stated Carlos Trujillo, Elizabeth Board of Education President. Trujillo added, "Our district has been in close contact with the Union County Prosecutor's Office to discuss ways we can bring the City of Elizabeth to the table on this very issue. We support the Prosecutor's efforts in requiring the Elizabeth Police to properly report this vital crime data to the public."

Meetings between the Elizabeth Board of Education and the Union County Prosecutors Office have been held to find ways to improve security in the school district and city as a whole. Representatives of the PBA divulged a letter in the press in November, 2010 with regard to the safety of their members in Elizabeth's Schools. The PBA did not show up at the meeting that was scheduled in the Prosecutor's Office, nor did anyone from the police department attend.

Even though local police departments are already required to submit quarterly reports to the Attorney General, it is important that the public be aware of all crimes being committed in their municipalities. "This isn't just a school problem; this is a community problem. We need to work together as a community to fight gang activity as it is impacting our children and the very city they live in," stated Board of Education member Francisco González. "Addressing the problem with hard facts and accurate data is the first place to start."



Astronomy Night at School No. 29

On a clear autumn night, approximately 250 students and parents from Dr. Albert Einstein Academy School No. 29 participated in Astronomy Night. Participants circulated among four astronomy activity stations which included telescope viewings of the Moon, Jupiter and its moons; a virtual night sky tour in the planetarium; and two learning activity tables.

On the school playground, one of the school's two telescopes was positioned to view the moon in its waxing gibbous phase. Assisted by teachers, Mr. Carmizino, Mrs. Alvarado and Mr. Roble, participants were able to see crater formations and the dark grey area called a maria. The second telescope was positioned to view Jupiter and four of its major moons, Europa, Ganymede, Io and Callisto. The telescope was powerful enough for the participants to see the bands of color on our solar system's largest planet.

In the planetarium, Ms. Tracy Espiritu guided visitors in a virtual tour of the night sky. She shared with them how to spot certain celestial objects such as planets and constellations, visible in the night and early morning.

AP Biology Students Get an Overview of Cancer and Its Treatments

Mrs. Abdel Hadi's AP Biology classes, from Elizabeth High School, were privileged to have Lee Greenberger, PhD as a guest lecturer to provide them with an overview of cancer and the current treatments for the disease.

Dr. Greenberger, Vice President of Research at Enzon Pharmaceuticals, presented 90 minutes of information which described the molecular basis of cancer including an understanding of mutations and altered signal transduction pathways that lead to uncontrolled cell growth. The lecture built from general concepts of cell structure and function (i.e. plasma membrane, DNA, phosphorylation) which are all part of the coursework in Ms. Abdel Hadi's AP Biology class.

The lecture covered methods for the detection of cancer followed by a short discussion on the molecular basis of treatments of cancer, many of which inhibit key targets that control cell growth. The final ten minutes of the lecture covered opportunities and career paths in cancer research.

Dr. Greenberger said, "Research and development in cancer is a very slow and painstaking process that can take decades for today's laboratory breakthroughs to benefit patients." That is why, according to Dr.



Greenberger, "it is essential that we attract the brightest and most capable undergraduate, high school, and even middle school students to careers in cancer research."

The students were very engaged during the lecture and many expressed their excitement about the subject matter. Many students also expressed their interest in pursuing a career in cancer research.



WHEREAS, H arriet T ubman personally m ade a t otal of ni neteen j ourneys t o l ead more than 300 slaves, including her parents, to freedom, and

WHEREAS, H arriet T ubman has e arned t he l ove, r espect and a dmiration of our nation for her role as the "Moses of the Black People."

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that appropriate studies and activities be planned in all of our district's schools to honor Harriet Tubman, a woman whose life was dedicated to assisting others achieve the freedom and independence so important to the human spirit.
