


Elizabeth Public Schools Celebrates Black History Month

Eighth Grade Students at Terence C. Reilly School No. 7 Create Projects to Educate Others about Genocide

Eighth grade students at Terence C. Reilly School No. 7 have reflected on the words of Holocaust survivor and human rights activist Elie Wiesel, "I swore never to be silent whenever and wherever human beings endure suffering and humiliation. We must always take sides. Neutrality helps the oppressor, never the victim. Silence encourages the tormentor, never the tormented." To extend Wiesel's message, students began an investigation of the recorded genocides throughout the world and created projects to educate others about genocide. Students reviewed letters addressed to President Obama, speeches, visual displays, essays,



petitions, songs, PowerPoints, short stories, artwork, movies, websites, poetry and dance, and sowed the seeds of activism through educating others in the school community. In the process, they have been able to redefine their ideas about what it means to be human and their individual and collective responses to people in crisis.

"I learned a lot. I began to wonder why the world was so cruel. I kept thinking, "Aren't we all humans?' This experience inspired me to help change the world around me,"

reflected Stephanie Trujillo.

Writing creative nonfiction, Neal Driz was affected by what he was researching, "I couldn't help but feel that the protagonist of my story may not just impact those who read my story, but me as well. The struggles that I made the main character undergo gave me a vivid visualization of what life was like in the Darfur region of Sudan. From what I was seeing through the eyes of my creation, I knew that writing this short story could create an impact that may positively alter the lives of many individuals who have given up hope."

Grace Calderon had a strong reaction to the project, "After researching information about the people who suffered as the result of genocide, I now realize that I need to help others who are suffering. I created a PowerPoint to let others know about all the genocides that have occurred."

Fabian Aristizabal found that, "The genocide project was one of enormous impact. I wrote a persuasive speech. It was not only a great learning experience, it was a wake-up call to everyone toward the issue of genocide and human rights violations. The best way to learn about history is to take part in it and I believe that is what I've done."

World History teachers Beverly Jones-DiSabatino and Mary Hillebrenner guided the students toward a deeper understanding of the sensitive material. The projects will be presented to the school community and later on in the year, the sixth grade class will interview eighth grade students to learn about genocide to help them prepare for their study of injustice, specifically to understand stereotypes and the roots of genocide.



Through education, the world changes and this was a powerful example.

The Polar Express at School No. 4



American History Project

During the planning of this project, students collected data from various resources. Students viewed documentaries of various Japanese people who were interned during World War II and discussed the reasons why American citizens were detained without proof of treason

Real World Math Experience

Fourth grade students in Mrs. Gertner's class at Charles J. Hudson School No. 25 are developing and applying math and money skills through real world shopping experiences.

At Mrs. Gertner's Store, students take turns working the cash register making change and selecting items within a budget. Students set prices for store inventory and receive varying amounts of money each day to spend in the store. With each day's allotted money, students use math skills to estimate which combination of goods they can purchase. The center helps connect the fourth grade math curriculum



to real life situations and teaches the students vital math skills for everyday life.

Technology in **Project Based Learning**

Mrs. Furnback's eighth and seventh grade Literature classes, from Robert Morris School No. 18, have been hard at work on a project integrating an interactive mapping tool into a lesson on the Holocaust and the internment of Japanese Americans. Using Intel Education's *Seeing Reason Tool*, students created a cause and effect map regarding different people, events, and situations that led to Hitler's actions and President Roosevelt's decision to intern 120,000 Japanese-Americans during World War II.

Offered as a free learning tool for schools, the *Seeing Reason Tool* is a fully interactive application which makes it possible for students to click on individual causes and effects and create detailed explanations. Mrs. Furnback stated, "Intel Education's Online Tools are a wonderful way to incorporate new and interesting technology into the classroom. It engages the students and motivates them to learn."

Parent Workshops at School No. 26

Dr. Orlando Edreira Academy School No. 26 welcomed parents for part II of a series of workshops led by Language Arts Coach Ileana Mena, entitled *Helping You to Help your Child*. These workshops, hosted by Parent Liaison Dency Rivera, are held throughout the year and address learning strategies across content areas which parents can implement at home. Parents have expressed much interest in these sessions and communication between teachers and parents has improved as a result. Student performance has improved as well. Future sessions will take place in late Spring.



Heart Health Month

For Heart Health Month, the first grade Bilingual class at Benjamin Franklin School No. 13 read *Hear Your Heart* by Paul Showers. The students then discussed how to maintain a healthy heart and wrote about their favorite heart healthy activity.
