With New High School Facility

Students of E lizabeth will be the recipients of a new state of the art high school to be constructed at East Jersey Street and Martin Luther King, Jr. Plaza. This new facility will be located next to the Jefferson Arts A cademy directly a cross the street from Elizabeth City Hall.

The ne w s chool w ill b e one of t he most t echnologically advanced a nd include s everal u nique l earning a reas to f urther pr omote excellence i n student p erformance. The n ew facility is de signed t o pr ovide 183,611 t otal net s q. f t. a nd i s e xpected t o hous e more than 1,000 students.



The di strict will di vide the school into three areas of concentration in order to provide even more specialized and post-secondary preparatory training for a ttending students. A VID (Advancement Via Individual Determination), International Baccalaureate and Gifted and Talented will all be a part of the new offerings for the new Academic High School.

In addition to traditional areas such as gymnasiums, a cafeteria and media center, the unique design will offer 35 general c lassrooms, 10 s cience l abs i ncluding t wo c hemical s torage r ooms, a s w ell a s ot her laboratories and w orkshops. T hese areas w ill i nclude m athematics, t echnology, phot ography (including darkroom) and c omputer s cience l abs. An a uditorium w ill be included w ith a s pacious s et design/woodworking area attached.

Specialized areas will include a greenhouse, architectural drafting (CAD) classroom, engineering robotics facility, a health and fitness area, one large art room, and three large music rooms (designated for band, choir and midi respectively). There will also be added storage areas and practice rooms for the musicians. Resource a nd r eading r ooms i nclude t hose de dicated t o l aw a nd f orensic s cience, t he i nternational marketplace, and engineering and robotics.

"We're looking forward to this modern facility for our high school students. It will not only provide more space and more diverse options for classes, but will provide a more supportive environment for facilitating academic, athletic and artistic excellence," said Elizabeth Public Schools Superintendent Pablo Muñoz.

Board President Carlos Trujillo stated, "I would like to thank our Governor for recognizing the significant need that our students have here in Elizabeth. T he Commission does not accept responsibility for a pupil who arranges other transportation or fails to be transported on an assigned route. Once assigned to a route, the billing for the pupil's reserved seat will continue until the Commission is otherwise notified in writing.
