EPS AND CITY OF ELIZABETH SET GUINNESS WORLD RECORDS® RECORD FOR LARGEST HUMAN IMAGE OF A SUBMARINE AT SCHOOL NO. 28



On June 4, Elizabeth Public Schools and the City of Elizabeth, NJ set a Guinness World Records® record for the Largest Human Image of a Submarine. An official judge from Guinness World Records® was on hand to verify the record and confirmed that 800 students of Juan Pablo Duarte- José Julián Martí School No. 28 set a new world record on the school's turf field. The students came together with support from members of the Elizabeth Public Schools learning community, the Greater Elizabeth Chamber of Commerce, The Elizabeth Destination Marketing Organization, members of the Elizabeth Board of Education, and City of Elizabeth dignitaries. Other prominent members in attendance included USS New Jersey Commissioning Committee officials Pete Engelman and Tim Doelger.

EPS NAMED 2025 BEST COMMUNITY FOR MUSIC EDUCATION BY NAMM FOUNDATION



Elizabeth Public Schools was among 935 districts across 44 states to be honored with the Best Communities for Music Education (BCME) designation from the NAMM Foundation for its outstanding commitment to music education. The BCME designation recognizes and celebrates outstanding efforts by school districts that have made music education part of a well-rounded education. Districts that have been selected as a BCME by the NAMM Foundation, now in its 26th year, are often held up as models for other educators looking to boost their own music education programs. The Elizabeth Public Schools music community has now received the BCME distinction for the sixth year in a row and the ninth time overall.

TWO EPS SCHOOLS NAMED 2025 NATIONAL SCHOOL OF CHARACTER BY CHARACTER.ORG



William F. Halloran School No. 22 and Juan Pablo Duarte - José Julián Martí School No. 28 were among 71 schools throughout the United States to be recognized as a 2025 National School of Character by Character.org.

Each year, Character.org and its state affiliates select schools and districts that demonstrate a dedicated focus on character development, which has a true positive impact on academic achievement, student behavior, and school climate.

Since its inception, the National Schools of Character program has impacted over three million students, staff, parents, and community members. The schools and districts that apply must meet the rigorous standards articulated in Character.org's 11 Principles Framework for Schools: A Guide to Cultivating a Culture of Character. Each school is assessed by a team of trained evaluators.

Elizabeth Public Schools is home to twelve district schools that have been designated as state schools of character, nine of which received national school of character honors as well. School No. 22 has become the sixth district school to have received National School of Character honors twice and School No. 28 has become the first district school to have received the distinction a third time.

SCHOOL NO. 52'S "SHARING IS CARING" PROGRAM NAMED A PROMISING PRACTICE BY CHARACTER.ORG



Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Early Childhood Center School No. 52's "Sharing is Caring" program was among 230 Promising Practices in schools and organizations certified by Character.org for 2025.

Character.org, founded in 1993 and formerly known as the Character Education Partnership, is a worldwide network of educators, researchers, and civic leaders that empowers people of all ages to practice and model the character strengths and core values that shape the hearts, minds, and choices of every person.

This year, Character.org received applications that focused on a wide range of practices which included peer mentoring, providing service-learning opportunities for students that connect to what they are learning in the classroom, empowering student voice and leadership, encouraging students to the "do the right thing" for intrinsic rather than extrinsic reasons, and programs that create a caring school community where everyone feels they belong. Many of the Promising Practices also involve parents and the local community.

School No. 52 was among 35 New Jersey schools to be recognized by Characer.org as a school with a promising practice.

EPS HIGH SCHOOL SENIORS PARTICIPATE IN YOUTH IN CITY GOVERNMENT DAY



Students from Elizabeth Public Schools participated in Youth In City Government Day, an event sponsored by the Elizabeth City Council and Elizabeth Board of Education that offers a glimpse into the day-to-day operations of the municipal government and school district and the services they provide to the Elizabeth community. The students began their day at the City Council Chamber of Elizabeth City Hall where they became honorary city officials during a morning conference. The morning also included visiting the James P. Mitchell Building, the central offices of the Elizabeth Board of Education, going on a city tour, and learning about the history of Elizabeth. The young officials were given the opportunity to learn job responsibilities from their city and educational mentors.
